
Lesson 2 – Where are you from? /Student Materials

Language we learnt in unit 2

- "My name is Maria" and "I'm Maria" are both correct and can be used in the same way. It answers the question, 'What's your name?'
- Where are you from? I'm from Japan. (your country)

Today we are learning how to use nationalities to tell people who we are.

• What is your nationality? I'm Japanese. (citizenship) It is usually the place where you were born.

Hello! My name is Carla. I'm from Italy. I'm Italian. Where are you from?








Hi Carla! My name is Kim. I'm from Japan. I'm Japanese. Where are you from?







Hello Kim! I'm Ivana. I'm from Russia. I'm Russian. Where are you from?






Hi Ivana! My name is Diane. I'm British. I'm from Britain. Nice meeting you all!










